Reveal logical
discrepancy
list in WB: SC

THE Supreme Court on Monday directed the Election Commission of India to publicly display names of 1.25 crore voters flagged for "logical discrepancies" at gram panchayat offices, block headquarters, and ward offices in the state.

Logical discrepancies, linked to the 2002 voter list, include mismatches in parents' names and biologically implausible age gaps between voters and their parents (less than 15 years or exceeding 50 years).

A three-judge bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and justices Dipankar Datta and Jaymalya Bagchi said those likely to be affected by the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the electoral rolls in West Bengal should be allowed to submit their documents or objections.

Directing that the exercise be conducted smoothly, the bench said, "Let us ensure that this exercise runs smoothly, it is timely completed by ensuring a transparent measure giving fair opportunity to all those who feel because of some discrepancy they are under unnecessary doubt."

Speaking at a rally in Barasat, TMC leader Abhishek Banerjee interpreted the Supreme Court's direction to the Election Commission as "slaps on faces of those who tried to deprive people of the fundamental right to vote."



DGP lands in trouble over sleazy video

Nitin Nabin unopposed candidate for BJP prez

The 45-year-old leader is youngest ever to take the hot seat

NITIN Nabin, 45, on Monday emerged as the unopposed candidate for the BJP national president. A formal announcement on his election will be made on Tuesday. A five-term Bihar MLA and currently the party's national working president, Nabin will be the youngest to occupy the top seat. He will succeed veteran leader J P Nadda.

His candidature was backed by top leaders including Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah. On Monday, in line with organisational rules, outgoing party chief Nadda and Defence Minister Rajnath Singh handed over Nabin's nomination papers to K Laxman, the returning officer for the election, at the party's central office.

Thereafter, Arunachal CM Pema Khandu and BJP leaders from Bihar, Andhra, Maharashtra, Assam, and Jharkhand submitted papers in his support. In all, 37 sets of papers favouring Nabin were filed, paving the way for his unopposed election as the BJP's 12th national president.

Nabin is taking over at a crucial time as he will have to lead the party through the Assembly elections in West Bengal, Assam, Tamil Nadu, and Kerala.

The first BJP chief to hail from Bihar, Nabin has travelled extensively across states since becoming BJP working president on December 14, 2025. During his interactions with cadre, his common message has been to become full-time politicians and give their 100% to serve people.

He entered mainstream politics in 2006, when the BJP fielded him from the Patna West Assembly constituency following the death of his father Navin Kishore Sinha, who had close ties with the RSS.

JAISHANKAR WARNS POLAND

'Don't fuel terror in our neighbourhood'

EXTERNAL Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Monday delivered a blunt message to Poland, warning it not to take actions that help fuel terrorist infrastructure in India's neighbourhood.

"You are no stranger to our region and are certainly familiar with the long-standing challenge of cross-border terrorism," Jaishankar said in his televised opening remarks during talks with his Polish counterpart Radoslaw Sikorski in New Delhi. "Poland should display



zero tolerance for terrorism and not help fuel the terrorist infrastructure in our neighbourhood."

The remarks reflect New Delhi's unease over a reference to Kashmir in a Poland-Pakistan joint statement, issued during Sikorski's visit to Islamabad in October, which went against India's position on the issue.

Jaishankar also criticised the West's "selective targeting" of India over New Delhi's energy ties with Moscow. Sikorski's three-day visit to India comes days ahead of a visit by the EU's top leadership to New Delhi. **P4**

If in case the ICC doesn't relent and Bangladesh withdraws,

the world governing body has to consider the way forward. And time is very limited before the first set of matches on February 7.

88,91,411 VOTERS IN GBA'S DRAFT LIST

Voter house verification from Jan 20 to Feb 3; Final list to be published on March 16



NAMMA Bengaluru has 88,91,411 voters, according to the ward-wise draft voters' list for five city corporations released here on Monday by the Greater Bengaluru Authority (GBA).

R Ramachandran, Special Commissioner (Election), GBA, said of the 88,91,411 voters in 369 wards, 45,69,193 are men, 43,20,583 women and 1,635 others. The draft voters' list was prepared for GBA elections based on details collected till October 1, 2025, he said.

He said from January 20 to February 3, booth-level officers (BLOs) will visit voters' houses for verification. During this period, they can submit claims and objections. Disposal of claims and objections will be done from February 4 to 18. The final voters' list will be published on March 16.

He said Ward 23 of Bengaluru West City Corporation has the highest number of 49,530 voters, while Ward 16 of Bengaluru East City Corporation has the lowest number of 10,926 voters. In all, 8,044 polling stations will be set up in 369 wards.

NEARLY 10 LAKH NEW VOTERS ADDED IN 3 YEARS

The State Election Commission said over 10 lakh new voters have been added since October 2022. Then, the list had 79,19,563 voters - 41,16,383 male, 38,03,747 female and 1,433 others. As per the October 1, 2025 draft list, the city has 88,91,411 voters, including 45,69,193 males, 43,20,583 females and 1,635 others.

"GRAM panchayat and cooperative elections too are held under the ballot system," the State Election Commissioner said. The other reason for the decision is to make the younger generation and new voters aware of the ballot paper system.

Asked about the possibility of rigging under the system and the likely delays in counting of votes as compared to EVMs, he said there will be no room for rigging and malpractice. CCTVs will be installed and police protection will be in place.

"The ballot system is returning to the city after a gap of nearly 15 years. The GBA Act specifies holding elections using ballots. Our officers are equipped to conduct free and fair elections on time. We will succeed," he said.

The Supreme Court recently directed the state government and State Election Commission to complete the civic body election in Bengaluru by June 30. "A notification will be issued after May 25 after SSLC and PUC exams," he noted.

On the likely polling date and challenges the SEC could face, Sangreshi said it is too early to say now as the commission is yet to release the final list of voters. He said the polling date is likely to be announced in April.

BJP flags rigging risk, delay in result

THE BJP has opposed holding elections to the five corporations of Greater Bengaluru Authority (GBA) using ballot papers, while Congress leaders said they do not see any problem and are open to face elections with the ballot system. However, leaders from both parties said a lot of manpower will be needed for the ballot system, and counting would take more time.

Former opposition leader in BBMP and BJP leader NR Ramesh alleged that the ballot system favours poll rigging. "Till 2001, the Congress party had a hold on Bengaluru city. It was possible as elections were held using the ballot system. Post this, Electronic Voting Ma-



chines (EVMs) were used, and in the 2010 and 2015 elections, of 198 wards, BJP won 112 and 100 wards respectively," Ramesh said. He added that except for Bengaluru Central City Corporation, the BJP is confident of sweeping the elections and alleged that to prevent this, ballots are being used.

Former mayor and Congress leader Gangambike Mallikarjun said there are both advantages and disadvantages in going back to the ballot system. "There has been a lot of confusion among the people and public representatives about EVMs. They feel EVMs can be tampered with, and have doubts whether the votes they cast are going to their chosen candidates. So returning to the ballot system would do away with their doubts, and they can be

confident," Gangambike said.

On the drawbacks, she said the ballot system would need more manpower. "Unlike EVMs which give results quickly, the ballot system will take more time to announce results," she said.

Former corporator M Shivraj, who faced his first election to Bangalore Mahanagara Palike in 2001 with the ballot system, said he doesn't see any problem in using ballots. "The State Election Commission, after discussions with stakeholders, has decided to hold elections using the ballot system.

Before we oppose anything, I feel we should face the first GBA elections and in the next elections, we can take a firm decision if we want ballots or EVMs," Shivraj said. Ballot or EVM, it is people who will decide who wins and we have to respect the voters, he said.





8th Yellow Line trainset reaches depot, testing to begin soon

ALL six coaches of an eighth trainset meant for Namma Metro's Yellow Line reached the Hebbagodi Depot on Monday, marking another step towards enhancing the passenger services on the corridor.

A senior official of the Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCL) said the coaches will first be assembled into a full trainset and then subjected to a series of mandatory tests.

"The train will undergo comprehensive static and dynamic trials, including signalling integration and running for a stipulated minimum number of kilometres. These tests will be conducted during night hours after passenger services are halted for the day," the official said.

Only after successful completion of these trials will the train be inducted into commercial operations.

On the proposed improvement in train frequency, the official said a decision would be taken once the timetable is finalised. "We will assess whether the additional trainset will be deployed to enhance services during peak hours or non-peak hours. Details on any frequency enhancement will be announced before the train is introduced into passenger service," the official added.

Reddy urges CM to refer probe to CBI...

FORMER minister Gali Janardhana Reddy on Monday urged Chief Minister Siddaramaiah to hand over the probe into the recent violent clashes in Ballari to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI). During the violent clashes between Congress and BJP workers, a Congress worker was killed, allegedly when a Congress leader's gunman opened fire.

Speaking to media here, Reddy asked Siddaramaiah why he was hesitating to hand over the investigation into the case to the

CBI. Accusing the CM of trying to protect the Congress MLA, Reddy said Siddaramaiah is aware that the legislator was responsible for the Congress worker's death. "The CM is trying to hoodwink people by getting three private gunmen arrested and handing over the case to the CID," he said.

Reddy said an innocent person died in the clash when Congress MLA Bharat Reddy, along with 5000 people, tried to target him by throwing Molotov cocktails at his residence, leading to the gunman opening fire. Reddy also claimed that it was an attempt to kill him.

CM and I will abide by top brass' call, reiterates DKS

KARNATAKA Deputy Chief Minister DK Shivakumar, who returned to Bengaluru after his three-day visit to Delhi on Monday, said that Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and he are bound to follow the Congress high command's decision on leadership change. "The CM and I have reached an agreement that we will abide by the decision of the high command. You (media) are worried about your TRP," Shivakumar hit back at media persons.

Shivakumar, who is also the state Congress president, said that the high command will take a decision at an appropriate time. "The MLAs will have their desires... there is nothing wrong with it," he said when asked about a section of legislators backing him for the top post.

Shivakumar said that the party came to power not just because of his hard work, but also because of every worker who burned the midnight oil in all 224 constituencies. "All 140 MLAs are also my supporters. CM Siddaramaiah is also supporting me. Do you know what the CM and I have spoken about? We know what we spoke in the presence of Rahul Gan-



dhi, high command... what we have decided after sitting together (over breakfast meetings). Can we discuss this issue openly in front of you (media)? Only time will answer everything," Shivakumar said.

He took exception to news reports that claimed that he did not meet Rahul Gandhi in Delhi, though it was earlier reported that he met the latter on the sidelines of the preparatory meeting held to discuss the upcoming Assam Assembly polls. Responding to questions on local problems at Badami, particularly the long-pending issue of relocating houses near the ancient cave monuments and the heritage Basadi, Siddaramaiah said the Tourism Department has already granted clearance for relocation.

"I am the CM, and during our tenure itself, these houses will be relocated," he assured, adding that residents have been suffering for years due to delays. He promised that the relocation would be completed before the end of his term, giving much-needed relief to affected families.

"In fact, when I was injured,



Menstrual cups safe to use, do not affect virginity, fertility: Experts

AS Karnataka prepares to roll out menstrual cups for girls in government schools, educators, parents and health experts caution that the initiative's success depends on busting myths and deep-rooted stigma around menstruation, particularly in rural and marginalised communities. Teachers in government schools say many girls hesitate to speak openly about menstruation due to family restrictions and social norms. Civil society organisations working at the grassroots say peer-led approaches have shown promise, but parental acceptance remains a challenge. Educators pointed out parental resistance driven by myths linking internal menstrual products to virginity, marriage prospects and fertility issues among schoolgirls.

Highlighting the health benefits, gynaecologist Dr Pallavi Prasad said, "Menstrual cups are safe for adolescents, do not affect virginity or future fertility, reduce rashes and allergies, allow participation in sports and swimming, and create less biological waste, making them ideal for school-going girls."

Saraswathi K, director of Rural Literacy and Health Program (RLHP), an NGO working in urban slums and rural villages, said adolescent girls are more open to trying menstrual cups when discussions take place within peer groups. "Some girls discontinue the use due to discomfort, while others adapt and encourage their peers", she said.

Parents hesitate even though there is no medical basis for it. "Fear and misinformation are still strong, in rural areas primarily. Parents lack exposure and access to information. But after a few awareness sessions, they realise that girls using it are safe, and the fear slowly begins to fade", said Sowmya, a parent. Mental health professionals say resistance is rooted more in cultural anxiety than health concerns. Denita Thomson, a trainee counsellor psychologist who conducts sessions for adolescent girls in schools, said menstrual cups challenge long-held beliefs around purity. "Anything involving vaginal insertion is often wrongly linked to sexual activity. Menstrual cups encourage girls to have a direct relationship with their bodies, it may feel threatening in settings where bodily autonomy is still questioned," she said.

Educationist Niranjananaradhy V P stressed the need to focus on parents. "This stigma is more prevalent in rural and marginalised communities. While the government and NGOs have worked on adolescent and reproductive health programmes, educating parents at scale is crucial," he said.

TO address the issue of menstrual hygiene and ensure sustainability, the health department is now promoting women to use menstrual cups, particularly students from Grades 9-12.

In the next two months, the department will start supplying menstrual cups to students in educational institutions. To make them comfortable and get used to the cups, they will be distributing sanitary pads and cups in such a manner that each will suffice for six months.

The department is also working with NGOs to train teachers and mothers in using menstrual cups, so children are aware and feel comfortable on the usage.

Health department officials said there were a few complaints regarding proper supply of pads. This issue has been addressed by NGOs, working with the education department at the school level, by distributing it with a head count of students and staffers.

The health department has allocated Rs 71 crore for the procurement of menstrual cups and sanitary pads, without involving middlemen in the supply chain.

Dr Meenkashi Bharath, gynaecologist, now involved in civic advocacy said, mothers are the major influencers of sanitary hygiene. So if they are educated, then children will feel comfortable on their approval.

In the meantime, efforts are also being done to trainanganwadis and teachers on the use of menstrual cups. This method was tried earlier and had seen a little success. She said, a lot of awareness is needed on this and so far 50% success has been attained.

Harsh Gupta, Principal Secretary at Health and Family Welfare Department said, orders have been placed for supplying menstrual cups to children studying in Grades 9-12. Tenders have been finalised and supply will start in the next

two months. In the meantime, money has been given to all the divisions to buy the menstrual cups and supply it to children.

Health department officials said there were a few complaints regarding proper supply of pads. This issue has been addressed by NGOs, working with the education department at the school level, by distributing it with a head count of students and staffers.

UNESCO TAG LIKELY FOR LAKKUNDI SOON: PATIL

THE tourism department and Lakkundi Development Authority (LDA) are working towards historic Lakkundi village being listed under a UNESCO heritage site soon. In addition, 44 sites in the village will soon come under the protection of the state government. Tourism minister HK Patil said on Monday.

A rooftop support stone called Bodhi Kambaba and what appeared like a stone-age weapon were found on the 4th day of excavation at Lakkundi on Monday.

As many as 16 sites in the historic village have already been declared as state-protected monuments. In addition, 8 more temples will be declared as protected monuments by the state government by the end of February, Patil told reporters after a meeting of the High Lev-

el Advisory Committee of the Lakkundi Heritage Area Development Authority (LHADA).

"In addition, the LHADA Commissioner of the authority has been instructed to submit a comprehensive proposal to the government within a month for including 20 more temples and wells in Lakkundi in the list of state-protected monuments. With this, a total of 44 sites in Lakkundi will come under the direct supervision of the government and more funds will be made available for their development and

protection," Patil said.

"Rs 10 crores has already been released for the development of five temples and an ancient well in Lakkundi. The tender process has been completed and work orders will be issued in February. Excavations will begin by March to identify the temples that are buried under the soil and revive them. Rs 1.65 crore has been released for the construction of an open-air museum to showcase the artistic splendour of Lakkundi," the minister said.

Women street vendors seek social security, better infra

THE Karnataka State Federation of Women Street Vendors was inaugurated on Monday during celebrations of Women Street Vendors' Day. The initiative aims to support the welfare and overall development of women vendors, who face daily hardships while providing affordable essentials to the public. They demand complete implementation of the Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014.

Highlighting their role in the urban economy, the Federation said women constitute nearly 53 per cent of the total street vendors in the State. Many women vendors shoulder multiple responsibilities - managing households, caring for children and elderly family members, and earning daily incomes by selling vegetables, fruits, flowers, clothes, toys, utensils and other essential goods from pavements and roadside stalls.

The federation noted that street vendors work in difficult conditions, braving heat, rain, cold and dust, and played a critical role during the Covid-19 pandemic by ensuring food reached citizens despite severe disruptions.

you with 100 per cent certainty that nobody can silence the voice of the people of Kerala," he said. Rahul also praised Kerala's political culture and the calibre of its panchayat presidents. "I don't think there are panchayat presidents of this quality in any other state," he said, urging newly elected representatives to protect the trust placed in them by voters and to uphold the Constitution.

He also asked the party leadership to address unemployment in the state.

SIR in Tamil Nadu: ECI extends period for filing claims and objections till Jan 30

HC: Analysis raises 'gold' switch doubts

THE Kerala High Court on Monday observed that the chemical analysis of the samples collected from Sabarimala prima facie reinforced its doubts that the original gold-clad dwarpalakas and door frames from the temple were replaced.

The court, citing the analysis reports from the Vikram Sarabhai Space Centre (VSSC), noted that the original gold-clad plates didn't have nickel and acrylic polymer layers, whereas the layers were present in the subsequently-plated copper plates. This, along with the absence of mercury and comparative thickness of the gold and nickel layers in the latter, clearly indicated a systematic and methodical process behind the execution of the alleged offence (of gold theft).

The court, citing the analysis reports from the Vikram Sarabhai Space Centre (VSSC), noted that the original gold-clad plates didn't have nickel and acrylic polymer layers, whereas the layers were present in the subsequently-plated copper plates. This, along with the absence of mercury and comparative thickness of the gold and nickel layers in the latter, clearly indicated a systematic and methodical process behind the execution of the alleged offence (of gold theft).

It said the reports not only disclose the manner and modus operandi of the alleged tampering and substitution, but also provide critical evidentiary pointers for correlating past transac-

tions with subsequent activities. The report, therefore, assumes central importance in the probe as it sheds light on multiple technical and material aspects and furnishes a scientific basis for evaluating transactions undertaken during 2024 and 2025, identifying the chain of decision-making, fixing individual responsibility and criminal liability, and examining the existence of any organised or concerted action amounting to

criminal conspiracy. However, the court refrained from disclosing additional technical particulars at this stage, noting the possibility of further arrests and recoveries.

The SIT informed the court that statements of approximately 202 witnesses have been recorded so far, while the recording of certain key witnesses under Section 183 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023, is in progress. Bank accounts of certain accused have been frozen, and the landed assets of some of the principal accused identified to trace the proceeds of crime.

ECI MUST CORRECT SYSTEMIC ERRORS TN S.I.R. REVIEW FLAGS

THE Election Commission of India's hasty conduct of the special intensive revision of rolls in Tamil Nadu has unleashed chaos and threatened the foundation of fair elections. This newspaper's rigorous data-driven investigation, backed by on-ground scrutiny, has opened a Pandora's box of operational shortcomings and arbitrariness. A staggering 97.4 lakh voters in the state were purged during the SIR, while a paltry 19 lakh applications trickled in for reinstatement. This sharp imbalance raises several questions.

Our analysis of 1,500 polling booths revealed a damning pattern: voters who voted in the 2024 Lok Sabha elections plus those deleted in the SIR often added up to nearly 100 percent or more of the electorate at more than three-fourths of the centres. The figures for 179 booths exceeded 100 percent, for 441 hovered at 95-100 percent and for 541 at 90-95 percent. If we accept the ECI's claim of diligent enumeration, three possible scenarios emerge: universal turnout in 2024 (impossible in reality), rampant bogus voting (a criminal outrage), or mass exodus in just one year (unlikely at most booths). Our on-field investigation as well as interviews with officials, residents and other stakeholders demolished these possibilities. Instead, we uncovered aggressive, haphazard deletions fuelled by sub-standard processes and an inept software that failed to weed out duplicates without collateral damage. Booth level officers seem to have marked 400-plus voters 'Shifted' in urban booths without evidence of duplicates or deaths. In other areas, deletions marked 'Absent' were rampant, including residents who still live there.

Worse, concurrent booth rationalisation—meant to cap voters at 1,200 per station by adding more booths—has sown utter confusion. Voters scrubbed from draft rolls now hunt fruitlessly for their names on deletion lists. Political parties' booth level agents, ideally positioned to spot errors, are handcuffed by the reshuffle. The result? A deliberate veil over the deletions' true scale, leaving the electorate in the dark.

With similar hasty revisions currently underway in other states under absurdly tight deadlines, the questions raised in Tamil Nadu resonate wider across the country. Absent elaborate analyses and local help, crores of deleted voters remain poised for shock on polling day. Those arbitrarily relocated face needless hurdles. Voters deserve accountability, not excuses. The ECI must immediately swing to action, overhaul its archaic systems and restore transparency. Without urgent redress, it risks eroding faith in India's electoral soul.

TEAM CLARITY, NOT EXCUSE, NEEDED AFTER SERIES LOSS

A sporting bastion is under threat: India's white-ball dominance in 50-over cricket. Such has been India's supremacy over the format that, except for Australia, no nation has come close to upsetting them from their perch atop the throne at home. But over the last 14 months, a slow shift has been caused by another team from the southern hemisphere—New Zealand. First, they handed India a 0-3 drubbing in home Tests. And this time, they secured a 2-1 ODI series win on Sunday. It was disconcerting that India lost the last two games readily after setting decent targets and then chasing under the lights. Over the last 16 years, India had lost only four out of the 30 home ODI series, but none to New Zealand. To add to the chagrin, the Kiwis achieved this feat with their second-string bowling attack.

One can point out that India will not be playing ODIs for the next six months, when the build-up for the 2027 ODI World Cup begins. However, losing an ODI series months after a 0-2 Test defeat against South Africa does not augur well for the team and its management. The latest loss will add pressure on head coach Gautam Gambhir a couple of weeks before the T20 World Cup begins at home. When India lost to South Africa in Tests, Gambhir had said he was the same coach who had helped India win the Champions Trophy (50-over format) and draw a Test series under new captain Shubman Gill in England. He reiterated that the Test series loss against New Zealand in 2024 was with a different set of players.

But there is enough indication that not everything is alright in the India dressing room. Virat Kohli seems to be in the form of his life. But apart from that spark, there are several concerns. A few key players are injured and there is a lack of clarity on roles. Gill was dropped at the last minute. The effectiveness of Kuldeep Yadav and Ravindra Jadeja is under the scanner. Hardik Pandya and Jasprit Bumrah are expected to walk in when India play an ODI next. Yet, before the T20 World Cup at home, India would have loved to avoid such an embarrassment. After all, it's a win that galvanises a team.

QUICK TAKE

IGNOBLE INTENTIONS

HELL hath no fury like Trump scorned. The US president has written to Norway's prime minister that he doesn't feel obliged "to think purely of peace" because he did not get the Nobel prize. The note was in reply to Norwegian PM Jonas Gahr Støre and Finnish President Alexander Stubb opposing his decision to impose tariffs on European allies who do not agree with his plan to control Greenland. Last week, María Corina Machado gifted her Nobel medallion to Trump. But the Norwegian Nobel Committee explained that the prize "cannot be revoked, shared or transferred". One wonders what pleasure the petulant billionaire gets with another shiny disc. Maybe it's similar to the feeling coursing through the unknown mastermind behind the 2004 theft of Rabindranath Tagore's Nobel medal.

HERE is a quiet shiver going down the spine of every global company in the business of selling products and services. The fear that was once a distant reality is now at the doorstep of many companies selling fast-moving consumer goods, durables and, literally, any company of any kind that has been a market leader for a while now. It is the fear of being overtaken by a new generation of customers who just don't want to touch what they have been marketing nonchalantly for a while.

What am I talking about? The biggest companies across the globe seem to be showing a thriving bottomline of profit and, at times, even a thriving topline of revenue. But the niggling worry in every boardroom is about being overtaken by a notion. A notion that fast becomes a movement. And a movement that very quickly becomes a part of counter-culture. A part of commercial counter-culture even, if you may call it that. Something that defines the very existence of the categories, products and the many brands that thrive within them.

Let me exemplify. Let me pick a beverage. Alcohol, for instance. Even as India witnesses a boom in alcohol consumption with the industry hitting a market size of \$60 billion in 2024-25, the world is struggling to fight a decline. All of a sudden, the young are drinking less and less, even as the old continue with their good old habits. Brands that created legacies of success for themselves in the alco-bev industry are today struggling to reinvent their relevance. Volumes are down, new launches do not meet with success and consumption seems to be threatened. Europe is in the lead in this movement, and the US follows.

Even as the first-generation world of alcohol consumption is struggling, India is on a different trajectory. Out here, growth is just about beginning. Or so it seems. I wouldn't take too hasty a call on that comment though. I would wait and watch.

The world of alcohol is globally threatened by a notion. This notion says alcohol is not good for the body or mind. The industry bites back and says anything in moderation is good. And that just might be the truth. Notions, however, know no truth. Notions are thoughts. Thoughts live and thrive in people's minds. And thoughts are viral. Most of these thoughts come to the fore in the minds of the young.

The young look at the generations that are ahead and do a critique on consumption, lifestyle, usage and habits of

their fathers and forefathers. Not to speak of their mothers. The young are quick and damning in their verdict. The verdict on alcohol for now is a firm no. Gen Z began the trend of sober parties where just no alcohol was served. The parties rocked. They happened early in the mornings after a run. They happened at all times of the day. Who says you need it to be a late night to party?

The Alpha generation, which is the single largest living cohort in our midst today, took it a step further: 'Bhajan rave' is a popular format in India, taking a leaf out of gospel parties that rock the Western world. A zero-alcohol party is the new and happening party to be at.

What does it do to the alcohol industry then? It makes it worry. It makes it think. It makes it ideate. It makes it come up with strategies to insulate topline growth. It makes it want to protect brand

names. Supermarkets in the US today have a five-fold presence of zero-proof options on their counters. For every popular alcoholic beer, there are five more popular options of zero-alcohol drinks.

If there are zero-alcohol parties and zero-alcohol game-days, the alco-bev industry has been quick to offer options with the same brand name, but just no alcohol in it for consumption. There is a desperate clamour to insulate topline losses of carefully-built-up volumes over the decades of the alco-bev.

Just as the industry rises to the occasion, the restaurant and bar business is reinventing itself as well. Walk into any bar in India today, and there are the cocktails, the mocktails and the cocktails that are zero-proof mimics of the original. Life has changed. And life is changing fast.

The notion is no longer a notion. It is a movement in North America and

Europe, where companies have been quick to sort the problem out for themselves. If you can't beat them, join them. Go with what the notion wants. Go with the movement. Don't fight it. Be a part of it to win within.

And so begins an entire new philosophy of marketing, where product categories and the brands within them are reinventing to play the game with a new generation of completely different consumers. Companies are redefining their entire vision and mission statements and are adding purpose statements to their corporate intent. These purpose statements talk of not only their existing customers, but their potential customers from the arena of counter-culture even.

Is this about alcohol alone? I don't think so. It will happen all across. Look around our lives. There is a battle between carbohydrates and proteins. The latter seems to be winning for now. Even your humble paneer is touting the percentage of protein in it. If protein wins, carbohydrate loses. Or does it? Time will tell. Eat less biscuits and eat more fibre instead. The biscuit company of today needs to reinvent itself quick and fast. And I do believe it is trying to.

Sugar is an enemy. So is salt. Maida is a criminal. Oil is a thug. There are a whole host of food ingredients that are under the scanner of the new-age consumer. Brands that use a lot of these need to be paranoid about the movement that is about to unfold, even in India. While some brands have woken up to the opportunity and are reinventing their business models, others are taking the shortcut of buying out brands that seem more holistic in their offerings from new-age startups. If you don't have the organic muscle to make it on your own, go inorganic. Buy it out.

Every industry—from cosmetics to air conditioners, fans to luggage, and packaging to literally everything else that clutters our consumer life—will go through this tumult. Companies need to sit up and smell the burn. In the beginning, it's just smoke. And where there is smoke, there sure is fire. Companies need to get their act right before the blaze is too big to handle.

There surely will be three kinds of companies. One will watch things as they happen. The second will make things happen. The third will wonder what happened.

As I wade my way through concerned boardrooms across categories of consumer items, my one big advice to each of them: be paranoid. Andy Grove was just so right: only the paranoid shall survive.

MUMBAI POLITICAL SKYLINE CHANGING



MUMBAI has always been important in national politics—even before Independence, and more so in the post-Independence period. Once, the fates of Maharashtra and Gujarat—together as parts of Bombay State till 1960—were anchored to this port city. Later, Mumbai became central to the demand for a separate linguistic state, as leaders of the Samyukta Maharashtra Movement (1956-1960) gave the call for "Mumbai saha Maharashtra" (Maharashtra with Mumbai), despite facing violent police action. Before the new state was carved out on May 1, 1960, the central government even considered making Mumbai a Union Territory or giving it to Gujarat. But Mumbai remained with Maharashtra.

Given this intense formative history linked to identity, the latest Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) election can be viewed as a major blow to the Marathi identity of the country's richest municipality. The Shiv Sena's loss of the BMC after almost three decades is seen less as a loss of resources and more as the erosion of a bastion of the 'Marathi manos' (Marathi person). The tussle appears to be over the city's identity, shaped since Bal Thackeray's Shiv Sena displaced the Congress in 1997.

One has to delve into the city's political economy and spatial distribution to understand how these elections may determine the future of state and national politics. Among the most notable factors is how the city's neoliberal economic model has given an upper hand to the non-Marathi-speaking population—specifically, the Gujarati-Marwari business community. While many of Mumbai's non-Marathi ghettos are swanky, they offer limited mobility for Marathi speakers because of prohibitive costs and relatively low average community incomes. Those who have not yet been forced to migrate to other municipalities within the Greater Mumbai Metropolitan Region remain confined to older chawls and chawls.

Recent infrastructural developments—such as the Coastal Road, the Bandra-Kurla Complex connector bridge and the Worli Sea Link—combined with a changing skyline, have altered perceptions of Mumbai. These could be highlighted by the new mayor and corporators to project a Gujarati-centric, if not cosmopolitan, outlook, ultimately blurring the visible markers of Marathi language and cul-

ture. In the long run, this will electorally benefit the BJP's urban cadre.

Another aspect of the political economy is 'gentrification'. The groundwork has already been laid for the new BMC to expand this phenomenon. Major projects of the city's development department—including the redevelopment of chawls and other huts in Worli, Ramabai Ambedkar Nagar and Dharavi—would now be easier to execute. The political gains could be long-lasting, as these ghettos

tos' collective aspirations historically produced voting patterns favouring the Congress, the erstwhile Republican Party of India and the Bharipa Bahujan Mahasangh (later called the Vanchit Bahujan Aghadi). Gentrification would disrupt this pattern and disperse these voters, giving a natural advantage to monolithic party structures like the BJP's.

Electorally, the BJP has been in firm control of the state since the Assembly elections of 2024. The BMC results could further push the city's real estate-driven development agenda. The central government, too, may promote Mumbai along the lines of GIFT City

near Ahmedabad, with a view to woo fence-sitting Marathi voters and ensure a more complete electoral consolidation of the state.

There are two Mumbais within the city. One is the Mumbai of the Marathi working class, with limited resources and smaller housing units; the other is the wealthier Mumbai of the business community. Political competition between the two is determined not only by demographic and spatial factors, but also by the resources these communities command.

The general perception is that the BJP's core constituency comprises Gujaratis combined with a growing Hindu north Indian population. Uddhav Thackeray's Shiv Sena, Raj Thackeray's Maharashtra Navnirman Sena and the Vanchit Bahujan Aghadi are nativist parties catering to Other Backward Classes, Dalits and migrants from the Konkan region. The Congress has retained sections of the Muslim vote, barring a few pockets in Mumbai. However, in both the Assembly and the BMC elections, the three regional parties were reduced to minority vote shares. The biggest blow to the Uddhav Sena was losing its bastion to the BJP, even though it succeeded in consolidating Marathi-speaking voters.

Growth under the BJP—especially projects like the high-speed rail link between Mumbai and Ahmedabad—could transform the city's housing sector and further alter its demography. This, in turn, will shape the nature of work Mumbai offers over the next five years. As the city becomes increasingly service-oriented, the expanding services and business workforce may blur the traditional party lines, giving an advantage to the BJP's evolving electoral formula.

The only major setback the BJP faced recently was its performance in the 2024 general elections, where its showing in Maharashtra was poor despite attempts at polarisation. With the BMC now under its control, the party will have time and resources to deepen its presence in Mumbai before the next general elections.

'From vital energy anchor to constrained secondary partner'

With Iran, India is executing a sharp commercial decoupling while maintaining a calculated diplomatic presence, says Ausaf Sayeed, former envoy to Saudi, Yemen

A former Secretary in the Ministry of External Affairs with 34 years of service, **Dr Ausaf Sayeed** is a leading expert on Persian Gulf and the Arab world. He has served as India's Ambassador to Saudi Arabia and Yemen and also held diplomatic postings in Egypt and Qatar, among other countries. He speaks to **Jayanth Jacob** about the protests in Iran and the evolving India-Iran relationship. Excerpts:

Is the current wave of protests in Iran qualitatively different from previous uprisings in terms of geographic spread, social composition and durability, or does it follow familiar patterns seen in 2009, 2017-18 and 2022?

The 2025-2026 protests mark a definitive qualitative rupture rather than a repetition of 2009, 2017-18, or 2022. Geographically, the uprising has engulfed over 180 cities across all 31 provinces, collapsing the centre-periphery divide that previously allowed the state to contain unrest.

Socially, it features an unprecedented coalition: historically conservative Bazaar merchants have joined workers, students, and marginalised border communities, transforming fragmented grievances into a unified national front. Politically, demands have shifted from reform to explicit regime change, rejecting the Islamic Republic's ideological foundations entirely.

This evolution is underscored by the deadliest repression since 1979—with confirmed deaths exceeding 3,000—signalling an irreversible, generational loss of faith in the system's legitimacy.

Do these protests signal a crisis of governance or a crisis of legitimacy, and which of the two poses a more serious long-term challenge to Iran?

While these protests stem from acute governance failures, they reveal a far more dangerous crisis of legitimacy. The economic data is stark—runaway inflation (40-50%), food prices up 70%, and a currency in free-fall—yet these remain theoretically fixable policy issues. The qualitative rupture lies in the public's diagnosis: a generation under 30 now views this hardship as inseparable from the regime's ideological DNA—specifically its nuclear adventurism, IRGC entrenchment, and unaccountable “deep state”. By explicitly rejecting the 1979 revolutionary project, protesters signal that the social contract is not just broken, but void. Consequently, while brutal repression may restore temporary order, it only widens the trust deficit, ensuring that this legitimacy crisis—not mere administrative breakdown—remains the regime's existential threat as the Supreme Leader's succession looms.

How cohesive is the Iranian state today, particularly the relationship between the



clerical establishment, the Revolutionary Guards and elected institutions, under prolonged internal and external pressure? The Iranian state currently embodies a paradox: operational security cohesion masking structural political fragmentation. While the IRGC remains dominant over the economy and coercive apparatus, the political system is fracturing. Elected institutions under President Pezeshkian are hollowed out by the “deep state”, and intensifying elite rivalries visible in Parliament. Speaker Ghalibaf's manoeuvres against the executive signals a contested rather than integrated leadership. Even the clerical establishment is eroding, with segments of the hierarchy alienated by the regime's brutality despite their existential dependence on it. Consequently, the state's survival has

shifted from an ideological consensus to a brittle, transactional reliance on IRGC, leaving it vulnerable to destabilisation during the looming post-Khamenei succession.

How has US policy toward Iran evolved under renewed pressure tactics? Are these steps more likely to weaken the regime or harden its resistance?

The US policy under Trump has evolved into a “Maximum Pressure 2.0” strategy, escalating from selective sanctions to a hybrid of economic strangulation and kinetic warfare. Key escalations include the June 2025 Operation Midnight Hammer strikes on nuclear facilities and a January 2026 ultimatum imposing 25% tariffs on Iran's trade partners to zero out revenue. While

economically devastating ac-

celerating inflation and currency collapse—the strategy has strategically backfired. Instead of forcing concessions, it has empowered security hardliners who now view nuclear and regional capabilities as non-negotiable tools of survival. By driving Tehran deeper into Chinese and Russian orbits, this approach is entrenching resistance rather than engineering the orderly regime change Washington envisions.

Where does India fit into Iran's strategic calculus?

In Iran's strategic calculus, India has been demoted from a vital energy anchor to a constrained secondary partner.

Bilateral trade has withered to \$1.7 billion (a mere 0.15% of India's total) as New Delhi aligns with US sanctions, ending any illusion that it can counterbalance Western pressure or rival China economically. Yet, geography ensures India's continued relevance. The Chabahar port and INSTC provide Iran with a critical logistical lung—a route to Russia and Central Asia that bypasses both Pakistan and China. Consequently, while India cannot compete with Beijing's \$400 billion economic umbrella, it remains a vital strategic hedge, preventing Iran's complete dependence on Chinese infrastructure and preserving a link to the non-Western world.

What is the future of the Chabahar port project, given sanctions uncertainty, regional geopolitics and Iran's internal challenges? Can it still serve as a viable connector for India to Central Asia and Afghanistan?

Chabahar's geography remains its greatest asset, but its survival now hangs on a sanctions cliff. While uniquely valuable as India's gateway to Central Asia bypassing Pakistan, the port's utility is being suffocated by Washington's “Maximum Pressure 2.0”. With the current US sanctions waiver set to expire in April 2026 and a looming

threat of 25% tariffs on Iran-linked trade, New Delhi has executed a “strategic retreat” in visibility: liquidating its \$120 million investment liability and shifting operational logistics to Iranian manpower to shield Indian entities.

Although officials maintain that “exiting is not an option,” the reality is starker: without a renewed waiver, shipping lines and insurers will flee, reducing Chabahar from the commercial hub once envisioned to a constrained, politically fragile connector kept alive only by diplomatic life support.

How should India balance its long-standing civilisational and economic ties with Iran against growing geopolitical risks?

India is executing a sharp commercial decoupling while maintaining a calculated diplomatic presence. With Indian banks freezing non-humanitarian transactions and trade shrinking to a statistical footnote, New Delhi has signaled that protecting its US market access is paramount—a shift reinforced by repeated evacuation advisories. Yet, the diplomatic door remains deliberately ajar: India continues to lobby for Chabahar waivers, citing “strategic autonomy” and regional connectivity. The emerging model is one of minimalist survival: pursuing tightly ring-fenced projects and rupee mechanisms to preserve a skeletal strategic link, while strictly avoiding high-profile exposure to US tariffs or Iranian instability.

India, UAE eye strategic defence pact, set \$200 billion trade target

INDIA and the United Arab Emirates on Monday agreed to deepen their strategic partnership, setting an ambitious target of doubling bilateral trade to \$200 billion within six years and moving towards the signing of a formal Strategic Defence Partnership agreement in the near future. The decisions were announced after talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and visiting UAE President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan in New Delhi, highlighting the growing breadth of ties spanning trade, defence, energy, infrastructure and emerging technologies.

“Went to the airport to welcome my brother, His Highness Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, President of the UAE. His visit illustrates the importance he attaches to a strong India-UAE friendship. Looking forward to our discussions,” Modi said in a post on X ahead of the meeting. Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri told reporters that the two sides had agreed to elevate defence coop-



eration to a new level. “India and the UAE will be signing a Strategic Defence Partnership Framework Agreement in the near future,” he said, adding that discussions covered defence industrial collaboration, advanced technologies, training and interoperability.

The visit comes at a sensitive moment in West Asia, with US President Donald Trump preparing to roll out Phase II of the Gaza Peace Plan, lending added geopolitical significance to the high-level engagement between New Delhi and Abu Dhabi. A joint statement issued after the talks said the two

leaders welcomed the “robust growth” in trade following the signing of the Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) in 2022. Bilateral trade touched \$100 billion in FY 2024-25, and both sides agreed to double this figure to \$200 billion by 2032.

Several agreements and Letters of Intent were finalised during the visit. They cover petroleum sector where, Hindustan Petroleum and ADNOC Gas enter into a contract. The UAE will partner with India in building international airport, a greenfield port, railway connectivity at Dholera in Gujarat.

Row over 'cop action' to seer at mela

A political row erupted on Monday as Jyotirpeeth Shankaracharya Swami Avimuktешwaranand Saraswati continued with his sit-in protest in Prayagraj against alleged “mistreatment” by Magh Mela police on ‘Mauni Amavasya’ on Sunday. While the seer sought an apology from the police, opposition parties including Samajwadi Party and Congress have condemned the incident and sought the intervention of Prime Minister Narendra Modi in the issue.

On Sunday, a brief disruption occurred when police stopped Swami Avimuktешwaranand Saraswati from proceeding to the Sangam along with a large number of followers. Superintendent of Police (Magh Mela) Neeraj Pandey said Avimuktешwaranand, without prior permission, attempted to enter the bathing ghat with around 200-250 followers after breaking a barricade at Bridge Number 2 and refused to stop despite being told about the rush of devotees.

the safety of devotees is our top priority,” the SP said. The disciples of Shankaracharya demanded that the mela officials escort Swami for Snam under fixed protocol. Senior Samajwadi Party and Congress leaders have condemned the incident.

Meanwhile, CCTV footage that surfaced on Monday showed chaotic scenes during Avimuktешwaranand's chariot procession. The video shows po-

lice barricades placed along the procession route. As the chariot approached, an argument broke out between the Shankaracharya's supporters and police personnel deployed at the spot. Moments later, supporters began pushing forward after breaking through the barricades. When the situation spiraled out of control, police officers attempted to disperse the crowd and restore order. However, the sup-

porters did not stop.

Asserting that mistreatment of saints was unpardonable, SP chief Akhilesh Yadav posted a video of the incident on social media and demanded a probe. “Is the Shahi Snan on Mauni Amavasya happening for the first time? The BJP's misgovernance and failed arrangements are solely responsible for this situation,” alleged the former UP CM.

Launching a blistering attack on the BJP over the incident, Congress' media and publicity department head Pawan Khera demanded that PM Modi must intervene. “They are only after power and money, beyond that they don't care about religion and faith,” Khera told the media. “We are all saddened by the mistreatment meted out to Swami. Since this incident, Shankaracharya has been on a hunger strike, but it seems no one in the government cares. The Modi government has unleashed its entire troll army against Swami, simply because he does not bow down before them,” said Khera.

The seer said that he would not take a dip in the Ganga until the police administration escorted him with dignity.

SC stays HC order on liquor vends along highways



THE Supreme Court on Monday stayed the Rajasthan High Court's order directing the state to remove or relocate all liquor shops within a 500-metre limit from national or state highways due to a surge in fatal road accidents.

“Issue notice. The effect and operation of the impugned order is stayed,” said a bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta.

While issuing notices on multiple pleas filed by various liquor vendors and Rajasthan government, the top court, however, said that the HC's “concern was genuine” and the government may consider it while formulating its liquor policy in future.

The HC order under challenge arose from a petition filed in 2023 by two residents of Sujangarh in Churu district. They had complained about liquor shops being located close to highways.



Will step in if air passengers get exploited: SC

THE Supreme Court on Monday said it would interfere with the “unpredictable fluctuations” in airfares and flagged the exorbitant rise during festivals.

A bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta termed the exorbitant rise of airfares by airlines as “exploitation” and asked the Centre and the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) to file their replies to a PIL seeking binding regulatory guidelines to control the unpredictable fluctuations in airfare and ancillary charges imposed by private airlines in India.

The SC listed the matter for further hearing on February 23 after Kaushik sought time to file a reply on behalf of the Centre.

Birla concerned over less time given to functioning of state legislatures

LOK Sabha Speaker Om Birla on Monday inaugurated the 86th All India Presiding Officers' Conference at the Uttar Pradesh Legislative Assembly and expressed serious concern over the declining time devoted to the functioning of State Legislatures.

Delivering the keynote address, Birla said legislatures are the primary forums through which the aspirations and voices of the people reach the government for resolution. “In this context, the declining time devoted to the functioning of State Legislatures is a matter of concern for all,” he said.

Emphasising the need for proper debate and discussion, Birla underlined the importance of ensuring a fixed, adequate duration for legislative proceedings. “The longer the House functions, the more meaningful, serious, and out-



come-oriented discussions will emerge in the larger interest of parliamentary democracy and people's interests,” he remarked.

The Conference began with a welcome address by Assembly Speaker Satish Mahana, who also read out Prime Minister Narendra Modi's message to the gathering. Addressing the Conference, Birla asserted that the conduct of a Presiding Officer must rise above party politics, remain completely impartial, and also appear impartial. He reiterated, “It is essential to

ensure a fixed and adequate time for the functioning of State Legislatures.”

Birla said that in the age of modern information and communication technology and social media, the conduct of public representatives is under constant public scrutiny, making adherence to parliamentary decorum and discipline more vital than ever. Maintaining the credibility of the House, he added, is a collective responsibility of all stakeholders.

Highlighting the importance of the Conference, Birla said such platforms promote cooperation among democratic institutions, strengthen coordination, and make governance more effective. “It is only through the Legislature that the voice of the people reaches the government,” he said, adding that dialogue and deliberation have proved parliamentary democracy to be the best democratic tradition.

While hearing that petition, the HC began examining road safety issues in depth. It referred to data showing a rise in drunk driving cases in Rajasthan in 2025 and recent accidents in which dozens of people had died within days. It had rejected the state's stand and said that the discretion given by the SC had been

misused and that treating highways as “municipal areas” defeated the very purpose of road safety. The HC had thereby directed that all liquor shops within 500 metres of National and State Highways be removed or relocated within two months. Following this, a batch of petitions by liquor vendors, and the state were filed before the SC.

Though the BJP fell short of the simple majority mark of 114, together with Shiv Sena's 29 corporators, the ruling Mahayuti alliance crossed the majority mark with 118 seats.

Defamation case: Appear or face action, Rahul told

CONGRESS leader and Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi did not appear before the Sultanpur MP/MLA court on Monday in connection with a defamation case against him, following which the court fixed February 20 as the next date of hearing.

Mishra alleged that during election campaigning in Karnataka in August 2018, Gandhi had made objectionable remarks against then BJP president Amit Shah.

One of his motivations, he explained during the discussion with author Mridula Ramesh, was to bridge the gap between the Sanskrit Puranas and the lesser-discussed Tamil mythologies. 

They will face the litmus test in the forthcoming budget session of Bihar Assembly as it is a million dollar question whether all constituents of INDIA bloc will be able to corner the mighty NDA in the house with a collective strength. This assumes greater significance as it comes in the backdrop of the INDIA bloc's Bihar poll debacle.

Plum post for babu 'shunted' out of Indore

OPPOSITION Congress has questioned the appointment of 2014 batch Indian Administrative Service (IAS) officer Dilip Kumar Yadav, as the MD of Madhya Pradesh State Tourism Development Corporation. Yadav was given the plum assignment in the state (which is counted among the top Indian states with major tourist attractions) on Sunday evening, a fortnight after being removed as the municipal commissioner of Indore, in the wake of deaths of residents due to contaminated water supply in Indore's Bhagirathpura area.

"After the deaths of innocent people in Indore's Bhagirathpura, a series of actions were initiated by the CM Dr Mohan Yadav, including the removal of municipal commissioner Dilip Kumar Yadav. The same official has now been given the plum assignment as MD of state tourism corporation. This suggests that it was not the faulty system of the Indore Municipal Corporation, which supplied contaminated water, leading to 24 deaths so far. Instead rewarding of the 2014 batch IAS officer with plum posting suggests that maybe the residents of Bhagirathpura ended lives on their own by arranging and drinking poisonous water," state Congress president Jitu Patwari said in Bhopal on Monday.

Dhyani, who lost both her parents, was being raised by her grandparents and relatives. According to family members, Dhyani was given a cough syrup brought from a medical store by her cousin uncle. Soon, her condition allegedly began to worsen rapidly. In panic, the child was rushed from one hospital to another but before treatment could even begin, she was declared dead.

Her aunt, Rupal Patel, raised serious suspicions and halted the last rites. "I received a call around 8 am saying Dhyani's health was very bad and that I should come to Vadodara," Rupal told the media. "Even before I could reach, another call came saying she had passed away. When we arrived, preparations for the last rites had already begun. That's when we became suspicious and immediately called the police. We demanded a post-mortem. Now, we are waiting for the report."

Starlink launch likely to get delayed over security worry

Indian govt wary of Musk's company as it faces security test in Iran

ELON Musk-led satellite communication service provider Starlink will have to wait longer to launch its commercial services in India, as security concerns have intensified following recent incidents involving its operations in Iran, officials said.

As per an official from the Department of Telecommunications (DoT), the government is unlikely to offer any leniency during the security clearance process. This comes after Starlink was found to have operated in Iran without proper authorisation or licensing, where the use of its services is banned by the Iranian government.

The company allegedly smuggled its equipment, including user terminals, into Iran over the past two years and operated services without a licence. Reports indicate that Starlink even waived monthly subscription fees for users in Iran after the government there shut down internet services. "Incidents like these have prompted the government to scrutinise Starlink's security aspects in India. The government is taking this matter very seriously and is carefully examining all factors before giving green signal for Starlink to operate in the country," the official said.

This is not the first time Starlink equipment has raised con-

cerns in India. In December 2024, Starlink routers and antennas were discovered in Manipur. Police in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands found that drug smugglers had used a Starlink Mini — a portable satellite communication device with an integrated Wi-Fi router — to communicate while operating in Indian waters.

Though Musk had stated Starlink's services were "turned

off" in India, reports suggested the devices continued to function in certain areas. This allegedly enabled individuals and militant groups in Manipur to access internet during government-imposed shutdowns.

Meanwhile, Starlink has claimed compliance with India's stringent security norms, including ensuring that all user traffic remains within India and is routed through local gateways instead of foreign ones. The company has obtained mandatory Global Mobile Personal Communication by Satellite (GMPCS) licence to offer satellite communication services to retail consumers. It has also secured a VSAT licence, along with authorisations for in-flight and maritime connectivity.

Apart from Starlink, the government has granted licences to Bharti Group-backed OneWeb and the Jio-SES joint venture, Jio Satellite Communications, to provide satellite communication services in India. The DoT has already allotted spectrum to these companies for demonstrating security compliance. However, so far, none of them has received final approval from security agencies.

As US, European countries head towards tariff war, India walks trade tightrope

INDIA is walking a diplomatic and trade tightrope as the United States and European countries edge towards a tariff war over the Greenland dispute, with trade experts urging caution to protect Indian exporters. While some analysts warn, going by past precedent under US President Donald Trump, Washington could slap fresh tariffs on major European trading partners, others believe the standoff could open opportunities for India to deepen its footprint in European markets.

"Political tussle over Greenland could spill over to other areas. It could result in a shift in the EU's position on trade and WTO issues vis-a-vis the US," said Abhijit Das, former head of the Centre for WTO Studies at the Indian Institute of Foreign Trade (IIFT). India signed a free trade agreement (FTA) with the UK last year and is likely to conclude an FTA with the EU in the near future.

Trump has announced a fresh 10% tariff on countries opposing his move to acquire Greenland. The US plans to impose tariffs on Denmark, Norway, Sweden, France, Germany, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Finland, despite trade deals signed in 2025. "There could be pressure on countries to reduce trade with the EU, failing which the US may impose punitive tariffs on them," said Das.

India, meanwhile, is main-

IT cos hire freshers, attrition rate slows

THE country's biggest IT services companies are still hiring thousands of fresh graduates and have reported stabilising attrition in FY26 so far. However, some firms have seen their total employee numbers fall year-on-year as automation and artificial intelligence reduce demand for mid-skill roles and drive restructuring.

Three of India's top five IT services companies reported a sequential decline in net headcount in the December quarter. Strong additions at Infosys and Wipro were offset by a sharp workforce reduction at Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), highlighting uneven hiring trends across the sector.

TCS reported a net fall of 11,151 employees in the December quarter sequentially. Tech Mahindra employees' count fell by 3,098 in Q3 sequentially and HCLTech's headcount fell marginally by 261 during the quarter. Meanwhile, Infosys added 5,043 employees during the quarter and Wipro reported net additions of 6,529 employees.

Despite these differences, all five companies reported lower or stable attrition. Infosys reported voluntary attrition of 12.3% on a trailing 12-month basis, HCLTech reported 12.4%, TCS reported 13.5% in IT services, and Wipro reported 14.2%, each down roughly 50-100 basis points compared to last year.

Restructuring

Most IT companies are unfolding their restructuring plans, which are described as a move

from a scale-and-manpower model to an efficiency-and-automation model.

Several firms highlighted restructuring-related actions and costs during FY26. TCS said its workforce review led to the release of 1,800 employees during the year so far and would continue into the next quarter. "We continue to hire, both from the lateral market and campuses. What we had announced as part of restructuring, we continue to look for support people with deployment in the future roles. Wherever we are not finding success, we are releasing," TCS said during the Q3 presser, adding that the exercise would continue into the next quarter.

TCS incurred restructuring costs of ₹253 crore in Q3, 77% lower than the ₹1,135 crore recorded in the previous quarter.

Wipro said it incurred restructuring charges of ₹263 crore during the quarter, and confirmed that the exercise is complete. HCLTech said its operating margin included an impact from restructuring costs linked to skill realignment. Infosys said productivity gains from AI and automation are changing delivery models.

Fresher hiring

Meanwhile, fresher hiring has continued at scale. Infosys hired about 18,000 freshers so far in FY26 and expects about 20,000 for the year. TCS plans to hire about 42,000 freshers, HCLTech has added over 10,000, and Wipro has hired over 5,000 and plans to hire around 7,500 in FY26.

Silver crosses ₹3L/kg, gold near ₹1.5L mark

FOR the first time, silver futures crossed the ₹3 lakh/kg mark, while 24K gold traded close to ₹1.5 lakh/10 grams in the domestic market, following a massive print in global prices.

The white metal shot past \$94.36/ounce (up 6.8%) and the yellow peer traded at \$4,696/ounce (up 2.3%) on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange at 1245 hrs IST on Monday.

Back-up options and potential injury replacements will be the focus

THE wounds of India's first-ever ODI series loss at home to New Zealand may still be raw but less than 24 hours later, head coach Gautam Gambhir was in Nagpur with the T20I team for a matchday minus two training session. The T20I stars had already assembled in the Orange city for the five-match series against the same opponents while some of the players and the support staff joined them on Monday.

There is no time to reflect or introspect with respect to the ODI series. Indian cricket have to move on to bigger things, at least for the time being. These five T20Is against New Zealand, beginning on Wednesday are all they have to find some form, figure out combinations and gain some momentum before the World Cup begins on February 7. While there are a number of things to worry about for captain Suryakumar Yadav, the top of the list would be the fitness of Tilak Varma and Washington Sundar. Varma, who experienced abdominal pain during Vijay Hazare Trophy and underwent surgery, is still recovering and has been ruled out of the first three T20Is. Though he is still named in the last two matches and the T20 World Cup, the selectors went on to add Shreyas Iyer to the T20I series squad in the middle of the ODIs as a precautionary measure. 

- Genital warts appear as soft growths in the genital or anal areas and are often painless leading to delay in seeking medical attention and treatment



POTENTIAL TO CAUSE CANCER

WARTS are one of the most common skin problems seen across all age groups, especially in children and young adults. They are usually harmless, painless, and non-cancerous skin growths, which is why many people choose to ignore them. However, medical experts warn warts are caused by a viral infection, they are contagious, and can spread to other parts of the body or to other people if left untreated.

Warts are caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV), a common infection spread through skin-to-skin contact. While most HPV strains cause benign skin growths, some types are associated with genital infections and, in rare cases, cancer. Early identification and treatment can help prevent its spread and complications.

HPV penetrates the skin

through tiny cuts or abrasions. Once inside, it infects the top layer of the skin and causes excessive cell growth, leading to the formation of a wart. "Different HPV types cause different kinds of warts. Common skin warts are usually caused by HPV types 1, 2, 3, 4, 27, and 57. Plantar warts, which appear on the soles of the feet, are most often linked to HPV types 1 and 2," said Dr Vinitha Varghese Panicker, professor and HOD of dermatology at Amrita Hospital, Kochi.

Medical experts point out that many people ignore the early signs of warts, mistaking them for calluses or minor skin changes. "Warts in early stages often appear as small, rough bumps that interrupt normal skin lines. Tiny black dots may be seen on the surface, which are actually clotted blood vessels. However, warts are contagious and spread mainly through direct skin-to-skin contact. The virus can also spread through indirect contact with contaminated objects such as towels, razors, soaps, footwear, and surfaces in communal showers or swimming pools," said Dr Anuradha Kakkatt, senior consultant in dermatology and venereology at Aster Medcity, Kochi.

The infection can also spread from one part of the body to another in a person. "Touching

or scratching a wart and then touching another area of skin can transfer the virus. Shaving over a wart or picking at it can also cause the virus to spread to nearby skin. Warts are commonly seen on the scalp and beard in men, often due to the use of shared or unclean razors in salons and barber shops. Moisture, skin maceration, and minor injuries increase the risk of infection," said Dr Vinitha.

Dr Anuradha added that people often tend to neglect the condition or depend on home remedies. "Warts are a social menace. It should be treated, and the spread should be prevented. Otherwise it will multiply and occur in others too," she emphasised.

Doctors added that many warts remain benign and may disappear on their own within months or a few years. However, untreated warts can also grow, multiply, and become painful. "In some cases, warts can cause physical issues like pain, difficulty in walking and using hands, infections from scratching, and psychological impact – distress due to visible warts. In immunocompromised individuals and in cases involving certain high-risk HPV types, there is a small but important risk of extensive disease and malignant transformation, particularly in the anogenital region," added Dr Vinitha.

The treatment depends on the type, location, the number of warts and the patient's immune status. For non-genital skin warts, first-line treatment usually includes topical salicylic acid preparations. Salicylic acid, available in concentrations ranging from 17% to 40%, helps peel away infected skin gradually. "When used regularly with proper soaking it has shown good cure rates, and is widely available over the counter. Treatment may take several weeks," Dr Vinitha said.

"Cryotherapy with liquid nitrogen is another commonly used option. This clinic-based procedure involves freezing the wart and is usually repeated every two to three weeks. Cure rates for common warts range from 50% to 70% after multiple sessions," said Dr Faizal M M, consultant dermatologist in Kochi.

Dr Anuradha stressed that warts should not be ignored simply because they are painless. "Avoiding direct contact with warts, not sharing personal items, maintaining good hygiene, and seeking early treatment can help prevent its spread."





First heart bypass surgery done without opening chest

For the first time ever in a human, doctors have performed coronary artery bypass grafting without having to cut through the patient's chest, similar to how many aortic valve replacement procedures are now done. The CABG procedure re-routes blood around a blockage in an artery carrying blood to the heart. In this case, the surgical tools were inserted and threaded through a blood vessel in the patient's leg, according to a report published in Circulation: Cardiovascular Interventions.

The results suggest that, in the future, a less traumatic alternative to open-heart surgery could become widely available for those at risk of coronary artery obstruction, researchers said. "Achieving this required some out-of-the-box thinking but I believe we developed a highly practical solution," said team leader Dr Christopher Bruce of the US National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute and Emory School of Medicine.

The procedure is called ventriculo-coronary transcatheter outward navigation and re-entry, or VECTOR. The patient in this first case was not a candidate for traditional open-chest CABG because of heart failure and old, poorly functioning artificial heart valves.

Six months after the procedure, the patient showed no signs of coronary artery obstruction, meaning the VECTOR approach was a success. Further testing in more patients is necessary before VECTOR is used more widely, but its successful debut is a major step in that direction. "It was incredibly gratifying to see this project worked through, from concept to animal work to clinical translation," Bruce said.

Don't fall for 'immunity booster' products, focus on lifestyle changes to stay healthy

HARMACY shelves and online marketplaces these days are crowded with products that promise to "boost" your immunity. From powders and capsules to herbal mixes, these so-called immunity boosters claim to strengthen the body's defence against illness. The idea is appealing, but the science behind it is far less convincing.

The immune system is a complex network that must remain in balance. Overstimulating it can lead to unintended consequences such as chronic inflammation or even autoimmune diseases, where the body begins attacking its own tissues. As Dr Padmanabha Shenoy, rheumatologist and medical director at CARE, Kochi, points out, "99% of the claims that an 'immunity booster' available in the market makes are hollow. There is no panacea for boosting immunity."

One of the few nutrients studied for its role in immune support is vitamin D. Some research suggests it can help regulate immune responses. But the problem lies in how people consume it. Many self-prescribe vitamin D supplements and purchase them over the counter without medical guidance. "The problem is that when you have an overdose of Vitamin D, it gets deposited in the body. At the maximum, a dose in a month will not cause much harm. Frequent



or high-dose intake, however, can lead to toxicity," Dr Shenoy warns.

Instead of chasing quick fixes, experts recommend focusing on lifestyle choices that support optimal immune function. A balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, regular physical activity, adequate sleep, stress management, and avoiding harmful habits like smoking are proven ways to keep immunity resilient. These measures don't "boost" immunity in the exaggerated sense, but help maintain its natural balance.

Respecting the complexity of the immune system and nurturing it through evidence-based practices is the safest path forward.

People should keep in mind that the immune system cannot be manipulated overnight with a pill or tonic. "Immunity is complex, and overstimulation can be harmful. What we need is to support its optimal function, not try to boost it indiscriminately," Dr Shenoy emphasises.

In short, immunity boosters are more about marketing than medicine.

Respecting the complexity of the immune system and nurturing it through evidence-based practices is the safest path forward.

On a Friday night in the city, getting past the door is often harder than deciding where to go. But increasingly, the question isn't which club has space. It's whether you're meant to be there. Across the city, a growing number of young and affluent Bengalureans are moving away from open nightife and towards smaller, invite-only spaces. From private techno nights and curated house parties to closed-run clubs and access-based dining experiences, socialising is becoming less about volume and more about control of the crowd, the pace and the people.

The appeal lies in spaces that feel deliberate. "We noticed some of our regulars didn't want big shows anymore. They didn't want exposure, crowds or weekend chaos," says Sreerag Herre, founder of Darkroom. The Darkroom Exclusives concept grew out of repeated requests from regular attendees who wanted something intimate rather than large-format gigs. Each exclusive edition hosts around 100 people, selected from a long-standing database of attendees built over years of shows. "In a smaller room, people come to socialise. They want to see who the other 99 people are," he says, adding, "People dress up, take their time, and feel like they belong there."

One platform quietly connecting many of these spaces is 8 Club. Founded by IIT Roorkee graduate Kunal Yadav, it began as a series of house parties before evolving into an invite-only social platform. "We realised that an invitation is a superior feeling. So we built a platform where you don't browse. You get invited," Yadav says. Access is filtered through applica-



tions, host invites and behavioural patterns. "We look at social, monetary and professional influence. Exclusivity is relative. Everyone has their own exclusive circle (on the platform). We just categorise it," he explains.

For members like Shreya, the appeal is ease rather than status. "It feels more intentional and less chaotic," she says, adding that she would likely stop using it if it were open to everyone. "A big part of why it works is that it's smaller and controlled. Otherwise, it would feel like any other party."

Not just Nightlife

Among these models is Putting Scene, a WhatsApp-born community that offers a paid access card to members, offering priority bookings, secret menus and off-beat experiences across the city, ranging from behind-the-scenes museum visits to experimental dining.

Founder Mannan Amroliwala says early data shaped the platform. "The events that sold out were priced at ₹4,000 to ₹5,000 a ticket. That's when we realised we had a very affluent customer base."

Unlike ticketing platforms, Putting Scene doesn't charge organisers to list



events. "The moment someone can pay to be listed, you stop being a curator. Not charging gives us editorial control," he says.

The access card focuses on three areas: priority access to high-demand events, experiences that don't otherwise exist, and dining. "People complain about eating out, but they love it. So we created Secret Menus – guaranteed reservations with a different menu and service layer, so it doesn't feel like a regular night," he adds. Often, what's on offer are chefs' unique creations and experiments that people get to try before they are put on the menu.

For members, the draw remains easy. "People come for birthdays or anniversaries because we take the planning off their plate. We focus on quality and exclusivity becomes a by-product," says Amroliwala.

This preference for smaller, intentional spaces extends beyond dinner and clubbing too. Communities like 56 Run Club operate on the same principle: Fewer people, stronger connections. What began as a group of 25 friends has now grown to around 400 members, with a waitlist nearing 10,000. Founder Arvind Srikanth says the draw isn't fitness alone. "Members value the experience more than the running. They want spaces where they actually feel included. In other run clubs, you could be among a hundred people and still feel lonely," he shares. Membership isn't based on pace or performance, but consistency and cultural fit, often through referrals. "Anyone can run. What keeps people coming back is how they feel when they're there," he adds.

For Natasha Sinha, who joined after returning from New York, that sense of belonging stood out. "Running brought me in, but the warmth of the community made it feel like home. The invite only nature feels thoughtful," Sinha opines.

NOW STREAMING**FITBIT****HOW TO FIX MUSCLE IMBALANCE**

Muscle imbalance occurs when one side of the body or one muscle group is noticeably stronger, tighter, or more developed than its counterpart. This can limit range of motion, reduce performance, and increase injury risk if left unaddressed. These stability differences can affect posture, movement patterns, and joint health. Common causes include repetitive daily activities, dominant side overuse, poor training habits, posture issues, or injury compensation patterns.

THREE CORE STEPS TO CORRECT IMBALANCE

- **Strengthen weak muscles:** Target underdeveloped muscles with isolated or higher-volume unilateral exercises to help them catch up.
- **Rebalance your workout movements:** Include exercises that oppose common patterns, like reaching or protraction moves to balance pressing and pulling exercises (e.g., push-ups, landmine presses).
- **Use single-limb training:** Training limbs individually forces each side to work, preventing the stronger side from compensating.
- **Start with the weaker side first and let it guide weight selection.** Examples include single-leg squats, Bulgarian split squats, single-arm rows, and single-leg deadlifts.
- **Prioritise mobility and warm-up:** Restriction in range of motion can promote compensation and imbalance. Include mobility drills in your warm-up targeting commonly tight areas like hips, thoracic spine, and shoulders; this improves movement quality and reduces imbalance risk.

ADDITIONAL TIPS

- **Stretch and release overactive muscles:** Tight muscles may pull joints out of alignment. Use stretching and foam rolling to relax and lengthen these tissues, improving balance and movement quality.
- **Improve posture and daily movement patterns:** Poor posture and habitual positions (like sitting or slouching) can reinforce imbalances. Postural awareness and ergonomic changes help prevent imbalance recurrence.

Fixing muscle imbalances isn't about striving for perfect symmetry; it's about identifying meaningful strength deficits, improving movement quality, and training each side deliberately.

EVEN though he made his debut with *Raja Hamsa* featuring a team of freshers, Jadeshaa K Hampi found recognition with *Gentleman*, the Prajwal Devaraj-starer that explored sleeping disorders, a rare subject in mainstream Kannada cinema. He followed it up with the sports drama *Guru Shishyaru*, featuring Sharan, and now returns with *Landlord*, a survival drama that brings Vijay Kumar and Raj B Shetty together on screen for the first time. The film also stars Rachita Ram, and marks the debut of Vijay Kumar's daughter Rithika. The film is slated for a January 23 release.

The idea for *Landlord*, says Jadeshaa, had been brewing for years. "I had planned this subject around the time *Guru Shishyaru* was taking shape, but I couldn't work on it then. Later, while working as a writer on *Kaatera*, the idea of survival stayed with me. In *Guru Shishyaru*, there is an underlying thought of 'Uluvavane-Odeya', and that stayed with me. Between these films, I kept developing *Landlord*. It is about survival and power, but with emotional conflicts and slightly matured characters."

Working with Vijay Kumar for the first time, Jadeshaa says shaping the antagonist was a key creative decision. "In *Kaatera*, the situation itself becomes the antagonist, so I couldn't explore a negative character much. But here, I was very particular that the an-

tagonist should be someone the audience already trusts, but in a darker shade. That contrast adds weight to the conflict. I wanted the hero to survive, not dominate."

Convincing actors for such a narrative, he admits, is harder than pitching a conventional commercial film. "For regular films, you can talk about hero build-ups and mass moments. But for films like this, actors must believe in the writing. Vijay Kumar is also a director; so he immediately understood the space the story needed. He knows that giving space to other characters strengthens the film. The same was the case with Raj B Shetty. He saw the writing and the layers in the character."
